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What is Suspicious Activity Reporting?



- Suspicious Activity: Observed behavior reasonably indicative of preoperational planning associated with terrorism or other criminal activity.
- Suspicious Activity Report (SAR): Official documentation of observed behavior reasonably indicative of pre-operational planning associated with terrorism or other criminal activity.

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Who can report suspicious activity?



Suspicious Activity Reports can come from a variety of sources:

- Public (Community Member)
- Law Enforcement
- Fire and Emergency Medical Services
- Emergency Management
- Private Security
- Child Protective Services
- Probation, Parole, and Corrections
- School Administrators, Faculty, and Studens
- Liaison Officers

ANYONE CAN REPORT!

Why are SARs Important?



- · Prevent threats through early identification and intervention
- Initiate criminal investigations
- Provide leads to ongoing investigations
- Track individuals that may pose a threat

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Suspicious Activity Reporting | What to Report



What information should an individual include when documenting suspicious activity?

Everything you can!

It is important to include all information obtained so that the full context of the incident is apparent to anyone who reviews the report. This includes detailed descriptions of people, vehicles, facilities, etc. It is also important to include your or complainant's information (name, phone number, etc.) if available.

When completing a suspicious activity report, individuals must remember the following:

- · The information must be legally obtained
- The information must be relevant to the identification of the subject or the subject's criminal conduct or activity
- The information gathered cannot be based solely on the political, religious, social views, race, ethnicity, or activities of any individual or any group

The Texas Suspicious Activity Reporting Network (TxSARNet) is a statewide suspicious activity reporting network recommended by the Texas Fusion Center Policy Council in order to create a holistic view of terrorism or crime-related suspicious activity in Texas.

TxSARNet facilitates a comprehensive collection, analysis, and response to terrorism, crime, and school safety related activity.

TxSARNet will assist Federal, State, Tribal and local law enforcement agencies in their efforts to detect, deter, and disrupt criminal activities.



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Texas School Safety



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Background



On May 18th a 17 year-old Santa Fe High School student walked in to an art class at his school with a shotgun and a .38 revolver that were legally owned by his father. He opened fire on students and school employees, killing ten people and injuring 13 others. He also had crudely constructed IEDs that failed to detonate.



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Roundtables



Texas Governor Greg Abbott hosted multiple roundtable discussions with victims, parents, educators, lawmakers, law enforcement and policy experts to help generate solutions that improve safety and security at Texas schools. On May 30, 2018, Governor Abbott unveiled his School and Firearm Action Plan.



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Texas Office of the Governor Action



As a result of recent incidents, Governor has Abbot has released the following action plans:

School and Firearm Safety Action Plan – May 30, 2018

Preventing Threats in Advance

The iWatchTexas is a statewide system that enables citizens and police officers to report pre-incident threat indicators and other suspicious activity through a mobile application, over the internet, or by telephone confidentially or anonymously. Using a single, state-wide reporting system, as opposed to a school-specific system, ensures that tips from various parts of the community are all integrated, providing a more holistic picture.

Texas Safety Action Report – September 12, 2019

Order #5 - The Department of Public Safety shall work with the Texas Education Agency and the **Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board** on ways to better inform schools, students, staff, and families about the importance of Suspicious Activity Reports and how to initiate the process.

Order No. 5 enhances the public's knowledge of SARs. It does so by providing information to those who work at, attend, or have a child attending a school, college, or university. Not only will this increase public safety across the state, it will also enhance safety at the state's schools, colleges, and universities.

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Uvalde police arrested two students accused



- 04/19/2018 Uvalde LE became aware of two teenagers, ages 13 and 14, allegedly planning to detonate improvised explosive devices before conducting a mass shooting at Morales Junior High
- Pair planned to steal weapons from a neighbor's home
- Developed a list ranking students by order of priority and then killing as many as possible before committing suicide
- Texas Rangers assisted local LE and it was discovered the pair was obsessed with the Columbine High School shooters and often referred to themselves using the shooter's names
- The pair had conducted internet researches related to tactics used by the Columbine shooters and read about how to make IED as recently as three weeks prior to their arrest
- Pair arrested on 04/25/2018 and placed in custody at a juvenile detention center. Ongoing investigation.



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Public Citizen SAR - Threat to School Safety

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Suspicious Activity Report received from anonymous source

- Concerned about Facebook postings made by identified 16 year old
- · Comments made about hating school, bullies, and his teachers
- Profile picture is one of the Columbine shooters
- · Unknown if subject has access to weapons

Action

- Analytical research conducted and an Instagram account was located where subject mentions killing animals, feeling homicidal, wanting to be a serial killer, and wanting to watch his teacher die.
- SAR and research disseminated to DPS assets in region. Texas Rangers made contact with local municipal PD and ISD PD
- Parents were contacted and were cooperative
 - Parents noted that they were having concerns and this was the push they needed to get student counseling
 - Weapons removed from home for safety
 - PD and ISD PD monitoring the situation




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<u> THP SAR – Threat to School Safety</u>

Suspicious Activity Report received from Texas Highway Patrol



- Located a rifle with approximately 100 rounds of ammunition (stated rifle belonged to father) and numerous knives concealed throughout vehicle
- Subject had preoccupation with making it to school
- Subject stated he had attempted suicide in 2014 or 2015 and would have preferred he had been shot than taken into custody
- · Subject advised jail staff that he had been depressed

Action

- · Analytical research conducted and disseminated to DPS assets in region
- Texas Rangers made contact with local municipal PD and ISD PD
- · Parents were contacted and were forthcoming
 - Subject is an adopted child and has many phobias
 - · Subject had been in public school, but had been put into a private school
 - · Subject has been put into counseling and schools were notified










































The Path Forward
